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**AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING**

**1                    South Baltimore Gateway Community Impact District – Establishment**

2        FOR the purpose of creating a Community Impact District, to be known as the South Baltimore  
3        Gateway Community Impact District; specifying the boundaries of the District; creating an  
4        Authority and providing for its rights, duties, powers, and funding; providing for the selection  
5        and composition of the Authority’s Board of Directors; providing for an Administrator for the  
6        Authority; mandating the financial responsibilities of the Authority and the City in  
7        conjunction with the operation of the District; specifying the City’s role in maintaining and  
8        enhancing existing services; designating the Board of Estimates as the agency charged with  
9        reviewing and approving various matters relating to the District and the Authority; providing  
10       for the renewal, expiration, and termination of the District and the Authority; including the  
11       Authority, its Board of Directors, and its staff within the purview of the City Public Ethics  
12       Law; providing for a special effective date; and generally relating to the existence, operation,  
13       and control of the South Baltimore Gateway Community Impact District and Authority.

11 **SECTION 1. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE,** That the  
12 Laws of Baltimore City read as follows:

13 **Baltimore City Code**

14 **Article 14. Special Benefits Districts**

15 **SUBTITLE 19. SOUTH BALTIMORE GATEWAY COMMUNITY IMPACT DISTRICT**

16 **§ 19 -1. FINDINGS.**

17 (A) *IMPORTANCE OF IMPROVING NEIGHBORHOODS AFFECTED BY THE CASINO.*

18 (1) THE NEIGHBORHOODS IN THE SOUTH BALTIMORE GATEWAY COMMUNITY IMPACT  
19 DISTRICT ARE ANTICIPATED TO BE THE NEIGHBORHOODS MOST AFFECTED BY THE  
20 PRESENCE OF THE NEARBY CASINO (THE “CASINO” OR THE “VIDEO LOTTERY  
21 FACILITY”).

22 (2) THESE NEIGHBORHOODS (THE “CASINO IMPACT AREA”) ARE ALSO COMMUNITIES  
23 CAPABLE AND DESIROUS OF IMPROVEMENT AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT.

24 (3) IN RECOGNITION OF THESE FACTS, THE STATE:

25 (I) HAS DESIGNATED CERTAIN FUNDS (THE “LOCAL IMPACT GRANTS”) TO  
26 MITIGATE THE EFFECT OF THE CASINO ON THE CASINO IMPACT AREA AND TO  
27 IMPROVE THE SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC CONDITIONS WITHIN THE AREA; AND

28 (II) HAS INSTITUTED A LOCAL DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL TO OVERSEE AND MAKE  
29 RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING THE USE OF THOSE FUNDS.

30 (4) TO BE EFFECTIVE, THESE FUNDS MUST BE DISTRIBUTED IN A MANNER THAT IS  
31 STRATEGIC, TRANSPARENT, AND RESPONSIVE TO THE NEEDS OF THE CITIZENS OF THE  
32 DISTRICT.

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1 (B) *NEEDS AND OPPORTUNITIES FACING THE DISTRICT.*

2 (1) THE SOUTH BALTIMORE GATEWAY MASTER PLAN OF 2015 IDENTIFIED A VARIETY OF  
3 NEEDS AND OPPORTUNITIES FACING THE CASINO IMPACT AREA.

4 (2) ACCORDING TO THE PLAN:

5 “RESIDENTS RAISED A RANGE OF CONCERNS ABOUT THEIR COMMUNITIES FROM THE  
6 SMALL-SCALE, SUCH AS A LACK OF ADEQUATE SIGNAGE AROUND A TRANSIT STOP,  
7 TO THE BIG PICTURE – A SHORTAGE OF FAMILY-SUPPORTING JOBS. AND THEY  
8 VOICED SUPPORT FOR THE STEPS NEEDED TO BRING NEW RESOURCES, ENERGY AND  
9 OPPORTUNITIES TO THEIR NEIGHBORHOODS AND TO [THE] AREA AS A WHOLE.  
10 WHILE THE PLAN FOCUSES ON IMPROVING THE LIVES OF PEOPLE ALREADY LIVING  
11 IN THE AREA, IT ALSO SEEKS TO CREATE AN ENVIRONMENT THAT WILL ATTRACT  
12 NEW RESIDENTS AND DEVELOPMENT.”

13 (3) THE PLAN CLEARLY EMPHASIZES THE IMPORTANCE OF LOCAL IMPACT GRANTS IN  
14 ACCOMPLISHING THIS VISION. IT SPECIFICALLY NOTES:

15 “IF USED EFFECTIVELY, THIS NEW FUNDING SOURCE WILL HELP TO STRENGTHEN  
16 COMMUNITIES IN SOUTH BALTIMORE BY SUPPLEMENTING, NOT REPLACING, WHAT  
17 IS AVAILABLE FOR COMMUNITY SERVICES AND DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES  
18 THROUGH EXISTING CITY RESOURCES. CITY AND COMMUNITY LEADERS ENVISION  
19 THIS NEW REVENUE AS LEVERAGING OTHER FUNDING SOURCES TO HELP REALIZE  
20 THE GOALS OUTLINED WITHIN THE PLAN.”

21 (C) CONSIDERATIONS.

22 IN ADOPTING THIS ORDINANCE, THE CITY COUNCIL HAS:

23 (1) CONSIDERED THE VIEWS OF THE PROPERTY OWNERS, THE RETAIL MERCHANTS, THE  
24 PROPERTY TENANTS, AND THE OTHER MEMBERS OF THE BUSINESS AND  
25 RESIDENTIAL COMMUNITIES WITHIN THE SOUTH BALTIMORE GATEWAY  
26 COMMUNITY IMPACT DISTRICT; AND

27 (2) MADE A DETERMINATION THAT THE SOUTH BALTIMORE GATEWAY COMMUNITY  
28 IMPACT DISTRICT WILL REFLECT:

29 (I) A DIVERSE MIX OF BUSINESS AND RESIDENTIAL PROPERTIES; AND

30 (II) A DIVERSE ECONOMIC, SOCIAL, AND RACIAL MIX.

31 **§ 19-2. DISTRICT ESTABLISHED.**

32 (A) *IN GENERAL.*

33 THERE IS A COMMUNITY IMPACT DISTRICT, TO BE KNOWN AS THE SOUTH BALTIMORE  
34 GATEWAY COMMUNITY IMPACT DISTRICT (THE “DISTRICT”).

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1 (B) *BOUNDARIES.*

2 THE BOUNDARIES OF THE DISTRICT ARE AS FOLLOWS:

3 ON THE SOUTH, A LINE BEGINNING AT THE INTERSECTION OF THE CITY LINE AND THE CENTER  
4 LINE OF THE PATAPSCO RIVER, RUNNING NORTH ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF THE PATAPSCO  
5 RIVER TO HANOVER STREET; THEN RUNNING NORTH ALONG HANOVER STREET TO MCCOMAS  
6 STREET; THEN RUNNING EAST ALONG MCCOMAS STREET TO THE CENTER LINE OF KEY  
7 HIGHWAY; THEN RUNNING NORTHEAST ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF KEY HIGHWAY TO THE  
8 CENTER LINE OF EAST FORT AVENUE; THEN RUNNING SOUTHEAST ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF  
9 EAST FORT AVENUE TO THE CENTER LINE OF STEVENSON STREET; THEN RUNNING NORTHEAST  
10 ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF STEVENSON STREET TO THE CENTER LINE OF KEY HIGHWAY;  
11 THEN RUNNING NORTH ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF KEY HIGHWAY TO THE CENTER LINE OF  
12 LIGHT STREET; THEN RUNNING NORTH ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF LIGHT STREET TO THE  
13 CENTER LINE OF EAST CONWAY STREET; THEN RUNNING WEST ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF  
14 EAST CONWAY STREET TO THE CENTER LINE OF SOUTH HOWARD STREET; THEN RUNNING  
15 NORTH ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF SOUTH HOWARD STREET TO THE CENTER LINE OF WEST  
16 CAMDEN STREET; THEN RUNNING WEST ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF WEST CAMDEN STREET  
17 TO THE CENTER LINE OF WASHINGTON BOULEVARD; THEN RUNNING SOUTHWEST ALONG THE  
18 CENTER LINE OF WASHINGTON BOULEVARD TO THE CENTER LINE OF SOUTH GREEN STREET;  
19 THEN RUNNING NORTH ALONG SOUTH GREENE STREET TO THE CENTER LINE OF WEST PRATT  
20 STREET; THEN RUNNING WEST ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF WEST PRATT STREET TO THE  
21 CENTER LINE OF SOUTH MARTIN LUTHER KING JUNIOR BOULEVARD; THEN RUNNING NORTH  
22 ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF SOUTH MARTIN LUTHER KING JUNIOR BOULEVARD TO THE  
23 CENTER LINE OF WEST LOMBARD STREET; THEN RUNNING WEST ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF  
24 WEST LOMBARD STREET TO THE CENTER LINE OF SCOTT STREET; THEN RUNNING SOUTH  
25 ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF SCOTT STREET TO THE CENTER LINE OF PRATT STREET; THEN  
26 RUNNING WEST ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF PRATT STREET TO THE CENTER LINE OF CAREY  
27 STREET; THEN RUNNING SOUTH ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF CAREY STREET TO THE CENTER  
28 LINE OF THE TRACKS OF THE BALTIMORE AND OHIO RAILROAD; THEN RUNNING WEST ALONG  
29 THE CENTER LINE OF THE TRACKS OF THE BALTIMORE AND OHIO RAILROAD YO THE GWYNNS  
30 FALLS; THEN RUNNING SOUTH ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF THE GWYNNS FALLS TO THE  
31 CENTER LINE OF WASHINGTON BOULEVARD; THEN RUNNING WEST ALONG THE CENTER LINE  
32 OF WASHINGTON BOULEVARD TO THE CENTER LINE OF HOLLINS FERRY ROAD; THEN RUNNING  
33 SOUTH ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF HOLLINS FERRY ROAD TO THE CENTER LINE OF THE  
34 TRACKS OF THE CSX RAILROAD; THEN RUNNING SOUTHWEST ALONG THE CENTER LINE OF THE  
35 TRACKS OF THE CSX RAILROAD TO THE CITY LINE; THEN RUNNING SOUTHEAST ALONG THE  
36 CITY LINE TO THE CENTER LINE OF THE PATAPSCO RIVER (POINT OF ORIGIN).

37 (C) *NEIGHBORHOODS INCLUDED.*

38 THESE BOUNDARIES ARE DESIGNED AND INTENDED TO ENCOMPASS ALL OF THE FOLLOWING  
39 NEIGHBORHOOD STATISTICAL AREAS, ACCORDING TO THE 2011 NEIGHBORHOOD STATISTICAL  
40 AREAS MAP:

14 **§ 19-3. AUTHORITY ESTABLISHED.**

15 (A) *IN GENERAL.*

16 THERE IS A SOUTH BALTIMORE GATEWAY COMMUNITY IMPACT DISTRICT MANAGEMENT  
17 AUTHORITY (THE “AUTHORITY”).

18 (B) *PURPOSE.*

19 THE PURPOSE OF THE AUTHORITY IS TO:

- 20 (1) PROVIDE THE DISTRICT WITH SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY, MAINTENANCE,  
21 SANITATION, AND OTHER PUBLIC SERVICES ABOVE AND BEYOND THOSE ALREADY  
22 PROVIDED BY CITY GOVERNMENT (THE “ENHANCED SERVICES”);
- 23 (2) DISPERSE GRANTS TO LOCAL COMMUNITY AND NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS WITHIN  
24 THE DISTRICT (THE “COMMUNITY GRANTS”);
- 25 (3) UNDERTAKE TRANSFORMATIONAL COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND ECONOMIC  
26 DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS, DESIGNED TO IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF LIFE AND  
27 ECONOMIC CONDITIONS WITHIN THE DISTRICT (THE “TRANSFORMATIONAL  
28 PROJECTS”);

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1           (4) IMPLEMENT THE RECOMMENDATIONS OUTLINED IN THE SOUTH BALTIMORE  
2           GATEWAY MASTER PLAN ADOPTED BY THE PLANNING COMMISSION IN 2015, AS  
3           THAT PLAN MAY BE MODIFIED OR SUPERSEDED FROM TIME TO TIME BY THE  
4           PLANNING COMMISSION; AND

5           (5) (4) PROVIDE OTHER SERVICES AND FUNCTIONS DETERMINED BY THE BOARD TO BE  
6           IN THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE DISTRICT.

7           (C) *FUNDING.*

8           (1) IN FISCAL YEAR 2017, THE CITY SHALL FUND THE AUTHORITY AT THE AMOUNT  
9           APPROPRIATED IN THE ORDINANCE OF ESTIMATES FOR FISCAL YEAR 2017.

10          (2) BEGINNING IN FISCAL YEAR 2018, THE CITY SHALL FUND THE AUTHORITY WITH NOT  
11          LESS THAN 50% OF THE LOCAL IMPACT GRANTS THAT ARE DISTRIBUTED TO THE CITY  
12          UNDER STATE GOVERNMENT ARTICLE § 9-1A-31(A)(1)(I).

13        **§ 19-4. POWERS AND FUNCTIONS OF AUTHORITY.**

14          (A) *GOVERNMENTAL BODY.*

15                TO THE GREATEST EXTENT ALLOWABLE BY LAW, THE AUTHORITY IS AND SHALL BE  
16                DEEMED TO BE A GOVERNMENTAL BODY, BOTH POLITICAL AND CORPORATE, EXERCISING  
17                ONLY THOSE POWERS AS ARE PROVIDED FOR IN THIS SUBTITLE.

18          (B) *POWERS AND DUTIES.*

19          (1) AFTER CONSULTATION WITH THE ADMINISTRATOR, THE LOCAL DEVELOPMENT  
20          COUNCIL, AND RESIDENTS OF AND BUSINESSES IN THE DISTRICT, THE AUTHORITY  
21          SHALL ADOPT AND UPDATE AT LEAST ONCE EVERY 5 YEARS A 5-YEAR STRATEGIC  
22          PLAN. AT A MINIMUM, THE STRATEGIC PLAN SHALL LAY OUT THE STRATEGIC  
23          PRIORITIES OF THE AUTHORITY AND HOW THESE WILL BE EXPRESSED THROUGH  
24          ENHANCED SERVICES, COMMUNITY GRANTS, TRANSFORMATIONAL PROJECTS, AND  
25          OTHER EFFORTS. THE STRATEGIC PLAN SHALL BE MADE AVAILABLE TO THE GENERAL  
26          PUBLIC, AT NO CHARGE, THROUGH A COMBINATION OF PRINT AND ELECTRONIC MEDIA.

27          (2) ~~THE~~ SUBJECT TO THE REQUIREMENTS OF § 9-1A-31 OF THE STATE GOVERNMENT  
28          ARTICLE, THE AUTHORITY SHALL ADOPT AND UPDATE FROM TIME TO TIME WRITTEN  
29          CRITERIA AND PROCEDURES FOR DETERMINING:

30                    (I) WHICH ENHANCED SERVICES IT INTENDS TO PROVIDE; AND

31                    (II) WHICH COMMUNITY GRANTS IT INTENDS TO DISTRIBUTE.

32          (3) THE AUTHORITY SHALL ADOPT AN ANNUAL BUDGET, AS PROVIDED IN § 19-7 OF THIS  
33          SUBTITLE.

34          (4) THE AUTHORITY MAY SPEND THE LOCAL IMPACT GRANTS RECEIVED BY IT IN A  
35          MANNER CONSISTENT WITH STATE AND LOCAL LAW, THE STRATEGIC PLAN, AND ANY  
36          CRITERIA OR PROCEDURES ADOPTED BY THE BOARD.

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- 1 (5) THE AUTHORITY MAY CONTRACT WITH A FISCAL AGENT TO PROVIDE ADMINISTRATIVE  
2 AND FINANCIAL SERVICES ON BEHALF OF THE AUTHORITY, SO LONG AS THE  
3 ARRANGEMENT BINDS THE FISCAL AGENT TO THE SAME LEGAL, PROFESSIONAL, AND  
4 ETHICAL STANDARDS TO WHICH THE AUTHORITY IS ITSELF BOUND.
- 5 (6) IF THE AUTHORITY DETERMINES THAT THE MOST EFFECTIVE AND APPROPRIATE MEANS  
6 TO PROVIDE A GIVEN SERVICE OR FUNCTION IS TO CONTRACT WITH THE CITY TO  
7 PROVIDE THAT SERVICE OR FUNCTION, IT MAY DO SO AS LONG AS THAT CONTRACT IS  
8 CONSISTENT WITH THE STRATEGIC PLAN.
- 9 (7) TO ACCOMPLISH ITS PURPOSES, THE AUTHORITY MAY CREATE AND OPERATE  
10 SUBSIDIARY ENTITIES CONTROLLED BY THE AUTHORITY OR CONTRACT WITH  
11 AFFILIATED NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS. THESE SUBSIDIARIES OR AFFILIATED  
12 NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS MAY RECEIVE FUNDING FROM THE AUTHORITY IF THAT  
13 FUNDING IS DETAILED IN THE APPROVED FINANCIAL PLAN AND CONSISTENT WITH THE  
14 PURPOSES OF THE AUTHORITY AND THE GOALS OUTLINED IN THE STRATEGIC PLAN.
- 15 (8) THE AUTHORITY SHALL EMPLOY AN OUTSIDE ACCOUNTING FIRM TO CONDUCT AN  
16 ANNUAL AUDIT OF ITS FINANCES. THIS AUDIT, ONCE COMPLETED, SHALL BE MADE  
17 AVAILABLE TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC.
- 18 (9) THE AUTHORITY SHALL OPERATE IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE STATE OPEN MEETINGS  
19 ACT AND THE STATE PUBLIC INFORMATION ACT.
- 20 (10) THE AUTHORITY MAY CONTRACT FOR AND PURCHASE GOODS AND SERVICES, SUBJECT  
21 TO CITY ORDINANCES AND POLICY REQUIRING ACHIEVEMENT OF GOALS REGARDING  
22 MINORITY AND WOMEN’S BUSINESS ENTERPRISES, BUT NOT SUBJECT TO THE CITY  
23 REQUIREMENTS REGARDING WAGE SCALES, COMPETITIVE BIDDING, OR OTHER LOCAL  
24 PROCUREMENT LAWS.
- 25 (11) THE AUTHORITY MAY ACQUIRE, HOLD, AND USE BOTH REAL AND PERSONAL  
26 PROPERTY AS NECESSARY TO ACHIEVE ITS PURPOSES, INCLUDING ACQUISITION BY  
27 PURCHASE, LEASE, OR OTHER MEANS.
- 28 (12) THE AUTHORITY MAY ENGAGE THE SERVICES OF AN ADMINISTRATOR, WHO MAY BE  
29 AN INDIVIDUAL OR AN ENTITY, TO ADMINISTER THE PROGRAMS AND UNDERTAKINGS  
30 OF THE AUTHORITY. THE ADMINISTRATOR MAY ALSO SERVE AS THE CHIEF  
31 EXECUTIVE OFFICER OF THE AUTHORITY.
- 32 (13) THE AUTHORITY MAY SUE AND BE SUED. HOWEVER, THE DISTRICT, THE AUTHORITY,  
33 ITS BOARD OF DIRECTORS, ITS ADMINISTRATOR, AND ITS STAFF SHALL BENEFIT, TO  
34 THE FULLEST EXTENT ALLOWABLE BY LAW, FROM ALL PROVISIONS OF FEDERAL,  
35 STATE, AND LOCAL LAW LIMITING THE LIABILITY OF EMPLOYEES, OFFICERS, AGENTS,  
36 AND OFFICIALS OF GOVERNMENTAL BODIES.
- 37 (14) THE AUTHORITY MAY ACCEPT GRANTS AND DONATIONS FROM PUBLIC AND PRIVATE  
38 SOURCES.

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1 (15) THE AUTHORITY MAY BORROW FUNDS FOR PURPOSES CONSISTENT WITH THE PUBLIC  
2 PURPOSES OF THE AUTHORITY. HOWEVER, NO BORROWING MAY BE FOR A TERM  
3 BEYOND THE DATE FOR THE DISTRICT'S RENEWAL UNDER § 19-16 OF THIS SUBTITLE.

4 (16) THE AUTHORITY MAY ENTER INTO PARTNERSHIPS WITH VARIOUS PROPERTY OWNERS.  
5 THESE PARTNERSHIPS MAY PROVIDE FOR THE PROVISION OF PERMITTED SERVICES AND  
6 BENEFITS BY THE AUTHORITY IN EXCHANGE FOR PAYMENTS ARRANGED BY  
7 CONTRACT, DONATION, GIFT, SERVICES IN KIND, OR OTHER MECHANISM BY WHICH  
8 FUNDS OR BENEFITS ARE PROVIDED TO THE AUTHORITY.

9 (17) THE AUTHORITY MAY ESTABLISH AND ELECT OFFICERS NOT ALREADY PROVIDED FOR  
10 IN THIS SUBTITLE AND PROVIDE FOR THEIR TERMS AND DUTIES.

11 (18) THE AUTHORITY MAY IMPLEMENT ITS PROGRAMS AND GOALS DIRECTLY THROUGH ITS  
12 EMPLOYEES OR THROUGH 1 OR MORE CONTRACTS. THESE CONTRACTS MAY BE WITH  
13 INDEPENDENT CONTRACTORS, CONTRACTUAL EMPLOYEES, OR OTHERS.

24           OUTSTANDING OBLIGATIONS OR TO PROVIDE RESERVES FOR UNCERTAIN  
25           OBLIGATIONS AND LIABILITIES; AND

26           (3) ARRANGE FOR THE DISPOSITION OF ALL REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY OWNED BY  
27           THE AUTHORITY AND SUBMIT ALL PROCEEDS TO THE CITY.

28       (C) *UNSPENT FUNDS.*

29           ANY UNSPENT FUNDS SHALL REVERT TO THE CITY’S GENERAL FUND AND SHALL BE USED  
30           FOR IMPROVEMENTS IN THE COMMUNITIES IN IMMEDIATE PROXIMITY TO THE VIDEO  
31           LOTTERY FACILITY, AS REQUIRED BY STATE GOVERNMENT ARTICLE § 9-1A-31(B)(3)(II).

“Agency” also includes:

- (1) Baltimore City Parking Authority;
- (2) Baltimore Development Corporation;
- (3) Baltimore Police Department;
- (4) Board of Liquor License Commissioners for Baltimore City;
- (5) Enoch Pratt Free Library of Baltimore City;
- (6) Housing Authority of Baltimore City;
- (7) Local Development Council, South Baltimore Video Lottery Terminal;
- (8) Pimlico Community Development Authority;
- (9) SOUTH BALTIMORE GATEWAY COMMUNITY IMPACT DISTRICT MANAGEMENT AUTHORITY; and
- (10) [(9)] any individual not embraced in a unit of City government who exercises authority comparable to that of the head of a unit of City government.

9 **Subtitle 7. Financial Disclosure**

10 **§ 7-8. Persons required to file – Agency officials and staff.**

11 The following officials and employees must file the financial disclosure statements required  
12 by this subtitle:

13 (38A) *SOUTH BALTIMORE GATEWAY COMMUNITY IMPACT DISTRICT MANAGEMENT*  
14 *AUTHORITY.*

15 (I) MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

16 (II) ADMINISTRATOR.

17 (III) ALL NON-CLERICAL EMPLOYEES OF OR ASSIGNED TO THE AUTHORITY.

18 **SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, That:**

19 (a) (i) Within 30 days of the enactment of this Ordinance, the Mayor and the City  
20 Council President shall appoint the members of the Board for which they are  
21 responsible under § 19-2. The Mayor and City Council expresses its desire that  
22 the appointments to be made by the State Senator and the House Speaker also be  
23 completed within that 30-day period.

24 (ii) The members first appointed to the Board shall serve initial terms, commencing as  
25 of the date of the enactment of this Ordinance, as follows:

26 (A) Of the 4 members appointed by the House Speaker under § 19-2(d)(1)(i):

27 1. 2 shall be appointed for a term of 1 year; and

28 2. 2 shall be appointed for a term of 2 years.

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1 (B) Of the 2 members appointed by the Senator under § 19-2(d)(1)(ii):

2 1. 1 shall be appointed for a term of 1 year; and

3 2. 1 shall be appointed for a term of 2 years.

4 (C) Of the 2 members appointed by the Council President under § 19-2(d)(2):

5 1. 1 shall be appointed for a term of 1 year; and

6 2. 1 shall be appointed for a terms of 2 years.

7 (D) The 1 member appointed by the Mayor under § 19-2(d)(3) shall be  
8 appointed for a term of 2 years.

9 (b) Within 60 days of the enactment of this Ordinance, the Board shall, at a minimum:

10 (1) retain a fiscal agent, if one is determined to be necessary or appropriate;

11 (2) resolve any procedural issues that might delay the transfer of local impact grants  
12 or other funds from the City of Baltimore to the Authority; and

13 (3) begin drafting a Baseline Services Agreement between the City and the Authority;

14 (c) Within 90 days of the enactment of this Ordinance, the Board shall:

15 (1) draft and, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimates, adopt Bylaws for the  
16 Authority; and

17 (2) draft a first budget for Board of Estimates approval, which may be for less than a  
18 full fiscal year; and

19 (3) on approval of the budget, promptly commence expending funds in the manner  
20 contemplated by the budget.

21 (d) By June 1, 2017, the Board shall adopt its first 5-year strategic plan.

22 (e) At any point, the Board may hire a paid Administrator. Until a paid Administrator is  
23 secured, the Chair shall serve as the interim Administrator, unless another person is  
24 selected by the Board. Any Board member serving as interim Administrator or in any  
25 other staff role shall do so as an unpaid volunteer.

26 **SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED,** That all provisions of this Ordinance are  
27 severable. If a court determines that a word, phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, subsection,  
28 section, or other provision is invalid or that the application of any part of a provision to any  
29 person or circumstances is invalid, the remaining provisions and the application of those  
30 provisions to other persons or circumstances are not affected by that decision.

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1       **SECTION 4. AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED,** That the catchlines contained in  
2 this Ordinance are not law and may not be considered to have been enacted as a part of this  
3 or any prior Ordinance.

4       **SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED,** That this Ordinance takes effect when enacted.
